
## Taking your VotePack further

#### Tip!

If you're not near your kitchen at the moment, think about what your favourite foods are and where they come from. Are any of them European?

#### Challenge:

We often describe food that is brought into the UK as having a **carbon footprint**. Foods that have travelled the furthest or have been transported by air have the largest carbon footprint. What does carbon footprint mean?

Making you want to do or believe a particular thing.




## Taking your VotePack further














Music
